





# <u>Cooper Vision, Optometry Giving Sight and Special Olympics: Improving Sight and Quality of</u> <u>Life of Individuals with Intellectual Disabilities – 2022 Report</u>

In 2022 Special Olympics, Cooper Vision and Optometry Giving Sight continued a shared commitment to the eye health and vision care needs of a most vulnerable population focusing on Eye Care Practitioner training through webinars and hands on experience as well as vision screenings including prescription of eye wear for people with intellectual disabilities (ID). In countries throughout the world, Cooper Vision and Optometry Giving Sight have provided vision-saving support to marginalized populations across the Global South, while building needed clinical and medical capacity to make eye health and vision care accessible to all. Special Olympics commends the strong and ongoing commitment of Cooper Vision and Optometry Giving Sight to strengthen institutional capacity, professional engagement, and mobilizing a multi-sector partnership base to provide solutions to one of the most critical health needs- especially in a post COVID19 global setting. The collaboration brings vision services, professional training, and clinical awareness in two key growth markets for Special Olympics: **Kenya and the United States of America**.

### **Continues Education webinars:**

In 2022 we continued to provide COPE approved CE free webinars mainly targeted to the ECP audience in the US. In total **5 webinars** were offered, delivered by Katie Connolly, O.D., Chief of Pediatric and Binocular Vision Service, Clinical Associate Professor at the University of Indiana :

In total **982 Attendees** took part in the webinar series. In addition, the webinars have been uploaded to the Special Olympics e-learning platform to be accessible. To date **121 individual ECPs** have visited the webinars online with in total over **700 engagements throughout all webinars** available. **263 ECP have completed CE requirements** to date.

## Opening Eyes Program at the Special Olympics USA Games in Orlando 2022





The 2022 Special Olympics USA games 2022 have united over 5.000 athletes and coaches from all 50 states and the Caribbean. During the Games Opening Eyes was offered for 5 consecutive days and screened in **total 1542 athletes** and 305 UNIFIED Partners. In total **954 prescription glasses** were provided to Athletes in need. The screenings were performed by **30 optometrists**, **12 opticians**, **57 optometry students**, **7 ophthalmic technicians and 9 non clinical volunteers**.

In addition 8 new Clinical Directors have been trained during the event.

#### Opening Eyes Program at the Special Olympics UNIFIED Cup 2022, Detroit

In July 2022, Detroit welcomed over 300 footballers from over 20 nations to compete in football (soccer)—the world's most popular sport. The Special Olympics Unified Cup took place 31 July – 6 August, 2022 and Special Olympics Unified Sports<sup>®</sup> is what made it uniquely inclusive: Teams that were comprised of footballers with and without intellectual disabilities playing together. Healthy Athletes including Opening Eyes was offered to the participants as well.

Opening Eyes screened **221 athletes and UNIFIED partners**, **54 prescription glasses and goggles** were provided to participants in need. The screenings were performed by 13 ECP's and 6 optometry students.

## Opening Eyes screenings and training of ECPs and Eye Care students in Kenya

In 2022 in collaboration with Cooper Vision, Optometry Giving Sight, the Kenyan Medical Training Center, the Masinde Muliro University of science and technology, the Lions FirstSight Eye Hospital and Special Olympics Kenya **Opening Eyes training and screenings have been taken place in 7 different sites in Kenya:**

In total **1495 children and adults with ID received critical eye care** and **158 received regular prescription glasses**. For many of the participants it was the first ever eye screening in their lives. The activities engaged 72 Eye Care Practitioners and 176 Eye care students actively involved in the screenings and trainings as part of the project

Special Olympics Lions Clubs International Opening Eyes®

With 1693 children and adults with ID screened we were able to **exceed** the proposed number of 500 athletes in the original partnership proposal.

One important element to the success of these activities is the training and engagement of eye care students from bot the Kenyan Medical Training Center and the Masinde Muliro University of science and technology. The students received first hand training on how to interact, screen and treat persons with ID. "I enjoyed working with the athletes and helping them restore their vision, helping someone see is kind of a miracle to them. I learnt a lot but above all it was the experience of dealing with the special group which is going to help me in my optometry practice in future. These clinics are important because most of these special people are neglected and kind of isolated from the rest of the community and when such clinics come to their communities, they just feel relieved" said Adelbert Ogachi, Optometry student at the KMTC.

#### Screenings, community engagement and care coordination

Through the partnership has enabled Special Olympics Kenya to provide critical care to the most neglected in rural areas of Kenia. This effort was supported through a wide range of community partners and networks. In each screening sites Special Olympics Kenya partnered with a local or regional hospital to coordinate care for those participants that received an urgent referral at the screenings. Frames and sunglasses were provided by global SOI sponsor Safilo, prescription lenses were provided by the Lions SightFirst Eye Hospital in Nairobi.

Transport was organized to enable all participants to get to the screening sites and back to their villages and group homes.
